## **RESTORATION UPDATE**

Construction delays caused by the record rains in January and February have pretty much been eliminated. Ground water levels are now low enough to allow heavy equipment to resume the building of levees and nesting sites and the rough contouring of the full tidal basin. Both nest sites I and 3 were constructed successfully. Construction of nest site 2 recently begun and will be finished in early summer. Construction of the culverts to connect the full tidal basin with the muted tidal wetlands also has begun. The last of the 310 truckloads of contaminated soil and other debris has been hauled off the site, less than originally expected. A floating dredge will be moved on schedule into the flooded site in September to carry out the final shaping of the full tidal basin.

Delivery of large rock is on going. The rocks will serve to protect levee slopes. These rocks will be placed along locations in the full tide basin to fortify the levee and protect it from wave attack once it is connected to the ocean. The rocks will also be used to construct the two short jetties at the mouth of the inlet. The temporary traffic signal on PCH will allow safe movement of trucks. Actual jetty construction will not begin until November of this year, however.

PCH bridge construction has resumed. Earlier in the year, excavation workers discovered buried remnants of the old Pacific Coast Highway and abandoned pipes in the bridge site, which slowed progress somewhat. The driving of piles that will support the bridge has begun with final construction scheduled for October of this year.

### PRESIDENT'S TERN

With another year and some months to go on the Lowlands Restoration Project, the Amigos de Bolsa Chica has been taking a look at the goals we have met and what our next steps will be. Now that our lobbying efforts are winding down, our primarily goal is education. Coastal saltwater wetlands like Bolsa Chica are among the most biologically diverse habitats on the planet, and we are so fortunate to have this unique and precious habitat in our backyard. But wetlands lack the "glamour" of places like tropical rainforests, so it takes extra effort to get the message out that these habitats are essential to the health of the planet.

Our tour program has long been the backbone of our education and outreach efforts, and we are committed to offering the best possible tours to schools, to private groups and to the general public. We are also committed to training docents with the best information available. We are now offering off-site slide and PowerPoint presentations that can be made in classrooms and at a variety of organizational meetings. We have recently published a unique and informative Educators Guide to augment the tour program. We are committed to monitor the Restoration Project, and we are planning another informative Town Hall meeting in October with the focus on the project's progress.

The Lowlands Restoration Project has been underway for several months, and despite some delays, due primarily to record rainfall, construction is only a little behind schedule. It is very exciting to all of us who care about preserving this unique and important habitat to watch the oil wells go, a see a new tidal basin being sculpted, and a to see a new bridge built over a new tidal inlet. After more than 100 years, the Bolsa Chica wetlands will once again be connected to the ocean. In a sense, we will soon have a brand new classroom. There has likely never been a dull moment in the history of the Bolsa Chica, and now is no exception, though this time it is for long-awaited reasons.

While we have cause to be grateful and to celebrate, our work is not done and probably never will be. We will always need volunteers with a variety of skills and interests who can help with tours, with developing educational materials, with raising the funds needed to keep the education activities going. We can never stop getting out the message that the Bolsa Chica is an irreplaceable jewel. The Amigos de Bolsa Chica has been working to do that for 30 years. There are few other groups like ours in California who can say that. Of course, we could not have done this work without incredible community support. If you feel strongly about maintaining the Bolsa Chica for generations to come, please give us a call. Whether you are new to the community or you've been here for a long time, the Amigos de Bolsa Chica needs your help.


# SIGN UP TODAY FOR THE EASIEST WAY YET TO MAKE DONATIONS

## **GROWING UP AT THE BOLSA CHICA GUN CLUB**

What was it like growing up as a teenager at the Bolsa Chica Gun Club? Ask Jim Okuda. From 1910 to 1935, his father was groundskeeper at the businessmen's hunting retreat on the bluff overlooking the Bolsa Chica wetlands. The gun club was built in 1899 by a group of wealthy Los Angeles and Pasadena businessmen. Many familiar names appeared on the club membership roster, such as Jonathan Slauson, Jared Torrance and Henry Huntington, whose trolley line stopped less than 200 yards from the clubhouse front door. Okuda's family was one of the few clubhouse staff who actually lived on the gun club property. Born in Huntington Beach in 1921, Okuda lived with his parents and siblings in a house below the clubhouse. When not attending school in Huntington Beach, Okuda spent the days fishing and swimming in the lagoon, helping tend his mother's chickens or enjoying sunsets from the beach. At times he would help his father care for the landscaping around the clubhouse, including a nine-hole golf course. Young Okuda watched as lines of chauffer-driven Duesenbergs, Cadillacs and Buicks dropped off bankers, industry leaders, sports figures, Hollywood stars, members of the 1932 Los Angeles Olympic Committee and even royalty. One slim, ordinary looking gentleman Okuda observed entering the clubhouse, the eleven year old was to learn later, was the Prince of Wales, two years later to be known as King Edward VIII of Great Britain.

Duck hunting was the major activity on the property. Each morning hunters would be taken out to the fresh water ponds that covered much of the Bolsa Chica. Instead of using dogs to retrieve downed ducks, local boys in hip boots were hired to do the work. Okuda was not old enough to play bird dog, but he sometimes tagged along and he can't forget the awesome sight and sound of several thousand ducks suddenly taking flight when startled by gunfire. The quantity and variety of waterfowl in the Bolsa Chica during that era were astounding.

Okuda remembers that all cooking, heating and lighting on the property was supplied by natural gas from a well in front of the clubhouse. The well was intended as a source of water, but the water was so saturated with natural gas, it was unusable for drinking or cooking. Instead, the gas was separated from the water and piped into the clubhouse and some of the other buildings on the property, including the Okuda home.

Okuda recalls one Friday evening in March of 1933 when a powerful earthquake struck. The quake, now known as the Long Beach quake, was caused by movement of the Inglewood/Newport fault. The fault passes directly under the Bolsa Chica and continues to the city of Inglewood. Being primarily of wood construction, the gun club buildings faired relatively well, but the road up to the clubhouse and the dam were riddled with deep cracks. And the 12 year old soon was to learn that his school had been destroyed by the trembler.

In 1935, when Okuda was 14, his father lost his gun club job due to a back injury. The family was desperate; these were depression years and there was no work. Then Okuda's mother realized that the experience the family gained raising chickens at the gun club would get them through hard times. They bought a small farm near what is now the intersection of Brookhurst Street and the 22 Freeway, By 1941 their chicken farm was operating in the black. Then Japan entered World War II and the family was ordered to the Japanese internment camp at Poston, Arizona. They turned their farm over to the care of their feed supplier and headed for Arizona. After the war, they reclaimed their farm and in a few years it again became highly successful. When freeway construction took over their business, they started a larger operation at Hazard and Bushard, but urbanization eventually forced the chickens out and welcomed mobile homes in.

## SLIDE SHOW PRESENTATIONS

As the education crisis continues in California, many primary school educators struggle to meet the California life science standards of incorporating the study of wetlands into their curriculum. when funding is simply not available to visit Bolsa Chica. In our attempt to "bring" the wetlands to the public, we now offer three unique presentations which are available to both children and adult groups all year long:

The Bolsa Chica Story is a 30-45 minute slide show and discussion telling the story of the Bolsa Chica: where it is, what it is, why it is important and its history from the earliest Indian inhabitants to the current restoration. It covers the nature of a tidal salt marsh as well as the birds, animals and plants that are found in such an ecosystem. The Birds of the Bolsa Chica is a 30-45 minute slide show and discussion of the birds of the Bolsa Chica. This program covers migration, seasonal variation of bird populations, and avian adaptations in a tidal salt marsh, while viewing beautiful slides of the birds of the Bolsa Chica. The Bolsa Chica Restoration is a full explanation of the restoration of the Bolsa Chica wetland in a Power Point program. The 30 minute presentation consists of maps, still photographs, diagrams and animations that detail one of the largest wetland restoration projects in California history. The program is updated periodically as the restoration progresses to its scheduled completion in the spring of 2006.
